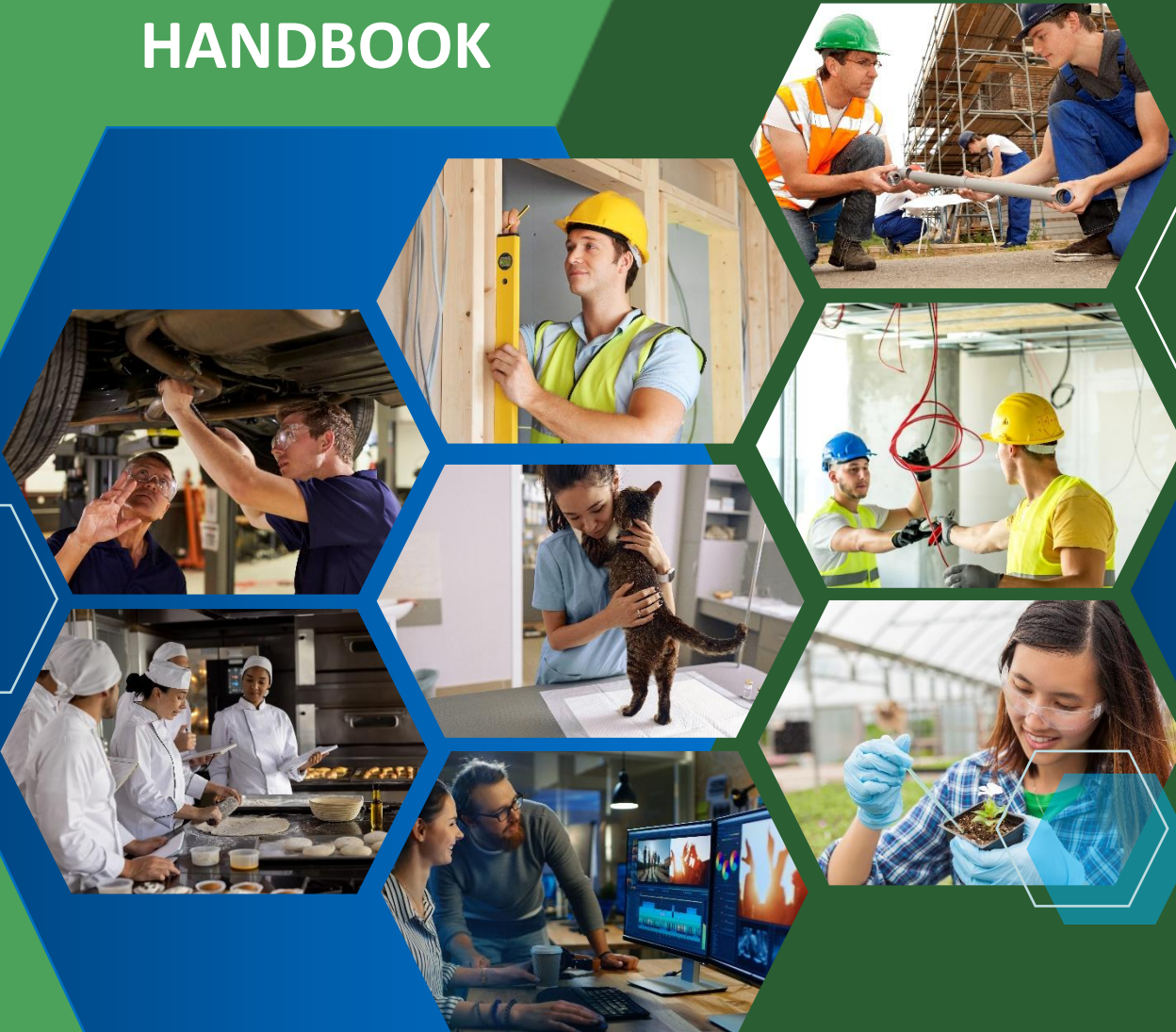

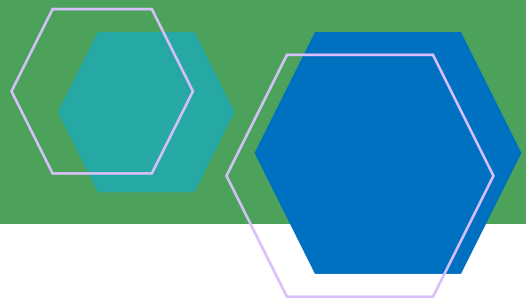

Privacy notice

When a student applies for a VET course, the student's school (Home School) will assist the relevant external provider (which includes a Delivery School and/or Registered Training Organisation (RTO)) with collecting student information for the purposes of assessing the application and placement of the students in VETDSS course. The Home School's Career Advisor or VET Coordinator will also work together with students to upload their application information into a secure online portal managed by the WynBay Local Learning Education Network, which is funded by the Victorian government.

When a student is accepted into a VET course, the Home School may assist the relevant external provider with collecting necessary student personal and health information needed for enrolment with the external provider, supporting students' educational, social and wellbeing needs, medical emergencies and other purposes stated in the Schools' Privacy Policy.

Once the student is accepted into the course, in order to ensure the safety and wellbeing of students and others, the school may also share necessary student information such as emergency contacts, health plans, foreseeable risks, or reasonable adjustments that it holds with the chosen VET course external provider (which includes the RTO and Delivery School) and where permitted by law.

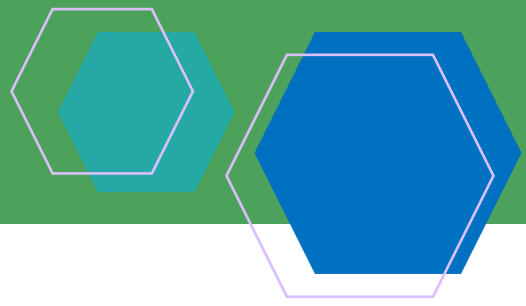


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WHAT IS VET DELIVERED TO SECONDARY STUDENTS PROGRAM (VETDSS)?

Vocational Education and Training (VET) programs delivered to secondary school students are designed to expand opportunities and pathways for students and improve educational outcomes in line with the Victorian Government's objective to increase the number of young people completing Year 12 or equivalent. The skills you learn relate to a career pathway, so can apply them at work or in further education and training. You can add a VET course or certificate to your studies while you're at school.

Incorporating VET in your VCE or VCE Vocational Major

VET can play an important role in senior secondary schooling. When you add VET to your VCE or VCE VM studies you gain practical skills in an industry you are interested in.

VET courses:

- provide a nationally recognised qualification in a specific industry, or provide credit towards one contribute towards the completion of your VCE
- allow you to study through School-Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships, which are often paid positions.

VET programs in the VCE and VCE Vocational Major:

There are a range of VET programs that you can select as part of your VCE or VCE Vocational Major. Please ask your school VET Coordinator or Careers Counsellor about the VET programs your school offers.

Combining VET with your Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC)

VET plays an important role in the later years of secondary school. Adding VET to your Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC) gives you practical work-related skills in a specific industry.

VET courses:

- Provide a nationally recognised qualification in a specific industry, or credit towards one.
- Contribute towards the completion of your VCE.
- Allow study through a [School-Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships](#). These are often paid positions.

Talk to your school about how you can combine VET studies with your VPC.

Apprenticeships and traineeships at school

Your VCE or VCE Vocational Major can also include an apprenticeship or traineeship. You can also combine an apprenticeship or traineeship with your VPC. Starting an apprenticeship or traineeship while at school means you can get paid on-the-job training that leads to a qualification. School-based apprenticeships and traineeships give you the confidence and vocational skills that employers need.

VET credit in VCE, including the VM and the VPC

Students gain credit into their VCE, including the VM, and the VPC by undertaking:

- [VCE VET programs](#) that have been developed by the VCAA in consultation with stakeholders including industry. Information regarding the VCE credit available in each VCE VET program is published on the individual VCE VET program pages on this website.
- approved [apprenticeships and traineeships](#) that are in the same industry areas as designated VCE VET programs
- other VET qualifications, which provide credit into the VCE through [block credit recognition](#)



VET credit towards the VCE, including the VM

VET credit towards the VCE, including the VM:

- Students can accrue VCE credit achieved through multiple VET qualifications at Certificate II level or above, up to a maximum of 180 nominal hours of completed units of competency (UoCs). This will give students two VCE units towards the VCE / VCE VM.
- Students who complete 180 nominal hours of UoCs in a certificate II or above, then move into another certificate III or above in the same industry* will accrue VCE credit at Unit 3–4 level for the next 180 nominal hours of completed UoCs.
- Students who complete 180 nominal hours of UoCs in a certificate II or above, receiving VCE Units 1 and 2 credit, and then enrol in an approved apprenticeship or traineeship will accumulate VCE credit from the apprenticeship/traineeship in the following order: Units 3, 4, 1, 2, 3, 4.

For example, a student completes 180 nominal hours of training in Certificate II in Kitchen Operations and receives VCE VET Hospitality Unit 1 and 2. The student then decides to move into a Certificate III in Carpentry SBAT. For their next 180 hours of training, they will receive VCE Units 3 and 4. Each additional 90 nominal hours of training would accrue VCE credit in the following order: Units 1, 2, 3, 4.

This policy applies to:

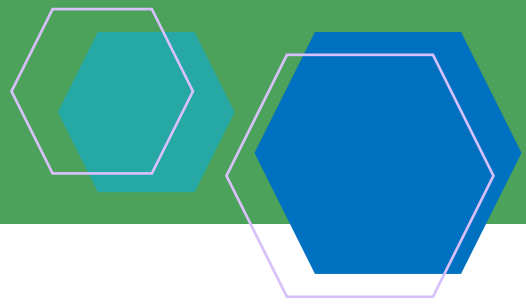
- all SBATs in certificates III or above
- certificate II traineeships that are in the same industry* as VCE VET programs drawn from certificate II qualifications that provide VCE Units 1–4 credit (typically trade pathways or pre-apprenticeship qualifications).

* Qualifications deemed to be in the same industry for VCE credit purposes are determined based on their Training Package Industry Code (e.g. BSB, SIT, AUR, etc.)

VET credit towards the VPC

Students will gain VET credit into the VPC in the following way:

- 90 nominal hours-worth of completed UoCs from a certificate I qualification or above will provide one credit towards the VPC.
- Students can accrue credit across multiple VET qualifications, up to a maximum of 180 hours. This will give students two units towards the VPC.



VET QUALIFICATIONS

Schools can offer senior secondary students VET qualifications selected from the range of industry areas approved by the VCAA.

Successful completion of VET in the VCE VM or VPC can provide students with:

- a VCE (including the VM), a VPC certificate issued by the VCAA, and a VET certificate issued by a registered training organisation (RTO)
- two statements of results issued by the VCAA giving details of units completed in the VCE, VCE VM or VPC and UoCs completed in the VET qualification
- an enhanced ATAR, which can improve access to further education
- pathways into employment and/or further VET qualifications or training
- workplace experience gained through structured workplace learning.

Students value VET because it:

- allows them to combine general and vocational studies which for many, provides a practical focus in a range of industry areas
- provides direct experience of business and industry
- enables them to explore training in areas that will enhance their pathway choices.

Employers value VET because it:

- contributes to the development of entry level skills for their industry
- provides students with a practical and focused introduction to workplace requirements
- enhances the employability of students
- enables industry to contribute to educational programs in schools
- enables industry to participate in local community networks.

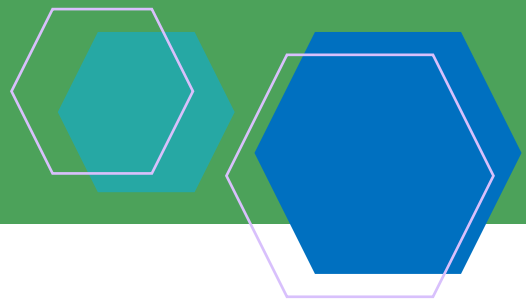

GENERAL VETDSS PROGRAM INFORMATION

TRAVEL ARRANGEMENTS

Some students will be required to travel independently to and from the venue of the course they have chosen.

Wednesday and Thursday are the agreed VETDSS delivery time in the Hobsons Bay VETDSS Cluster. There will be a cluster bus provided on these days. It travels to all the schools in Hobsons Bay Cluster (bus times will be provided at the start of 2027).

When VET classes have finished for the day, all students must leave the HOST school's premises in a swift and timely manner.

STUDENT BEHAVIOUR OUTCOMES

Students will abide by the teacher's rules and the rules of the HOST School whenever they are on site. This includes meeting Occupational Health and Safety Requirements in and out of the classroom. Attitude and behaviour are to be of the expected standard.

Breaches of safety or serious offences will require students to be sent out of class. The HOST school VET Coordinator /RTO must communicate this by writing and phone to the HOME and HOST SCHOOL VET Coordinator where applicable on the day of the incident.

All incidents that occur relating to a student's behaviour must be escalated to Stefan Colosimo (WynBay LLEN - VDSS Cluster Manager) on the day of the incident so a course of action can be negotiated by all parties. All correspondence by all parties should be in writing. The action that might occur depending on the severity of the student's behaviour could result in a warning or a meeting between the Home School VET Coordinator, HOST school VET Coordinator, a parent, and the student.

A review of the student's continued participation in VET will be considered. Serious breaches in behaviour can result in an exclusion from VET.

DRESS CODE

Students are required to wear their Home School uniform when attending VET programs at delivery schools within the cluster. If attending University or TAFE students must comply with University / TAFE requirements. When students are completing a practical subject, students must bring their required safety or work clothes to the class and change once they have entered the school/venue. Students are not required to wear school uniform on SWL.

Please note if any student studying a trade arrives at their VET class without their correct clothing, they will be asked to leave class immediately. The HOME school VET Coordinator must be called when a student is asked to leave a VET class.

VET EXCURSIONS

Students are required to any course-organised excursions which run at various venues and only need an informative notice of excursions throughout the year. Attendance for excursions, if they differ from the scheduled VET day, depends on the specific arrangement made between the school and the training provider, and must comply with any [Department of Education policies](#). Where practical, Host schools should try to arrange excursions during scheduled VET day/class.

STUDENTS ABSENCES

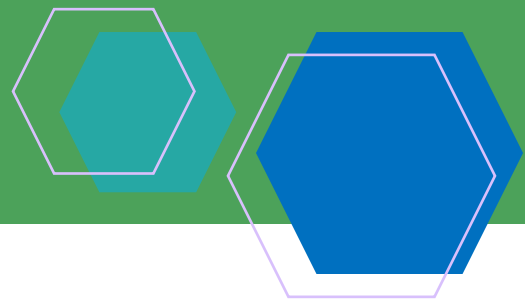
Students are permitted a maximum of 2 absences per semester or 4 for the year. An additional 2 approved absences will be allowed per year for school camps, excursions etc. Any more absences may result in the student not satisfactorily completing the units/modules. Students need to notify their VET Co-ordinators, trainers and/or the workplace in advance.

STUDENT CHARGES FOR VET

Please be aware that there is a student charge for all VET programs. VET programs can be very expensive and so the cost of the program should be considered carefully before selecting a VET. Please see your VET Co-ordinator for charges for 2027. Please be aware that there is no REFUND if you do not withdraw from the VET program before the withdrawal Census date. Please see your VET Co-ordinator for details about withdrawing.

MINIMUM CLASS SIZES AND CHANGES TO PROGRAMS

Please be aware that if numbers are insufficient to meet a minimum class size the VET program will be withdrawn. Please note the following arrangements and course outlines are subject to change. Courses delivered at different sites may include modules which vary from the sample course outline included in this booklet. Students will be notified of changes prior to course commencement.



WHAT IS STRUCTURED WORKPLACE LEARNING (SWL)?

- Structured workplace learning provides students with the opportunity to integrate on-the-job experience with secondary study as part of the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE), the VCE Vocational Major or the Victorian Pathways Certificate.
- Schools must implement this policy and follow the guidance on the [Guidance tab](#), when planning for and conducting structured workplace learning arrangements, to ensure compliance with legislation.
- Principals may nominate other school-based staff to authorise structured workplace learning placements. Refer to [Roles and responsibilities](#) for more information.

Structured workplace learning provides students with the opportunity to:

- integrate practical on-the-job experience and learning in workplaces with nationally recognised Vocational Education and Training (VET) undertaken as part of the VCE, the VCE Vocational Major or the Victorian Pathways Certificate
- undertake work placement to complement an applied learning program as part of the VCE Vocational Major or the Victorian Pathways Certificate
- demonstrate the practical application of work-related skills as part of VCE Industry and Enterprise.

Structured workplace learning provides the opportunity for:

- enhanced skill development
- practical application of industry knowledge
- assessment of units of competency
- achievement of some learning outcomes
- enhanced employment opportunities.

Structured workplace learning arrangements

All structured workplace learning arrangements must comply with [Ministerial Order 1412 – Structured Workplace Learning Arrangements \(PDF\)](#).

The department's comprehensive guidance, on the [Guidance tab](#), supports schools to comply with their obligations under Ministerial Order 1412.

Structured workplace learning arrangement form

The Structured workplace learning arrangement form must be completed and signed before the structured workplace learning commences. It must be signed by:

- the employer
- the student
- the parent/carer of the student – if the student is under 18 years of age
- the principal or nominated person – the principal may nominate a person or a member of a class of

persons (nominated person), for example, assistant principals, teachers or education support staff employed by the school, to perform the powers and functions of the principal which relate to structured workplace learning. The principal must ensure that nominated persons have the required knowledge and understanding of obligations in the [Education and Training Reform Act 2006 \(Vic\)](#) and [Ministerial Order 1412 \(PDF\)](#) relating to structured workplace learning arrangements. More detail on the provision of principal nomination for SWL can be found in the guidance chapter, [Roles and responsibilities](#).

Government school users can access the form on the dedicated Work-Based Learning Application (WBL App). Refer to the guidance chapter, [Structured workplace learning arrangement form](#) on the [Guidance tab](#) for further details.

The department's [Structured workplace learning travel and accommodation form \(PDF\)](#) must be used if:

- it is proposed that the student may need to undertake vehicle travel with their employer and/or supervisor during the arrangement, including travel to-or-from the workplace
- the student is required to stay in accommodation other than their normal place of residence while undertaking structured workplace learning.

This form must be signed by:

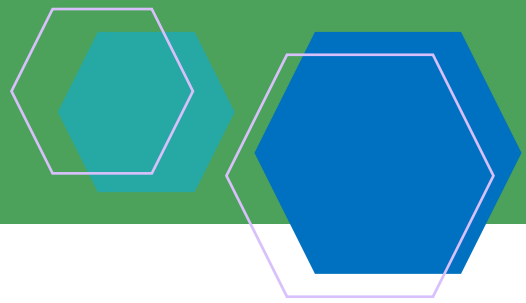
- for travel – both the employer and the parent/carer – or the student if they are aged 18 years or over
- for accommodation – the parent/carer – or the student if they are aged 18 years or over.

Work-Based Learning Application

The Work-Based Learning Application (WBL App) enables government schools to digitally coordinate and process structured workplace learning arrangements. This includes the creation and management of digital arrangement forms.

Occupational health and safety

Principals or nominated persons must be satisfied that a student is either undertaking or has completed occupational health and safety (OHS) training prior to commencing structured workplace learning as follows:

- where a student is undertaking structured workplace learning as part of a VET program within the VCE including the VCE Vocational Major, or the Victorian Pathways Certificate – the principal or nominated person must be satisfied that the student is undertaking, or has completed the OHS training unit of competency within the VET program
- where a student is undertaking structured workplace learning which is not related to their VET program within the VCE including the VCE Vocational Major, or the Victorian Pathways Certificate – the principal or nominated person must be satisfied that the student has completed an OHS program required by the department as follows:
 - if the student is undertaking VCE Industry and Enterprise – they must complete [safe@work](#)
 - if the student is undertaking structured workplace learning to complement an applied learning program as part of the VCE Vocational Major or the Victorian Pathways Certificate – they must complete [safe@work](#).

Child Safe Standards

All Victorian schools are required to comply with the Child Safe Standards to ensure they are well prepared to keep children and young people safe and protect them from abuse. [Ministerial Order 1359 – Implementing the Child Safe Standards – Managing the risk of child abuse in schools PDF](#)) provides the framework for child safety in schools. The Child Safe Standards require schools to put in place systems and processes to help prevent harm to students in all school environments, including workplace learning environments where students undertake:

- work experience
- structured workplace learning
- school community work/volunteering
- and school-based apprenticeships and traineeships.

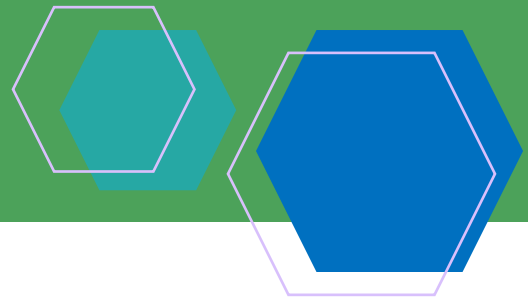

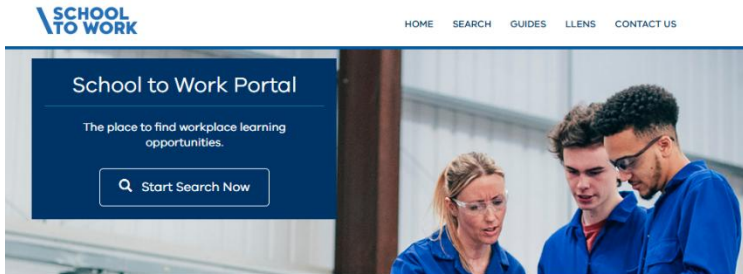

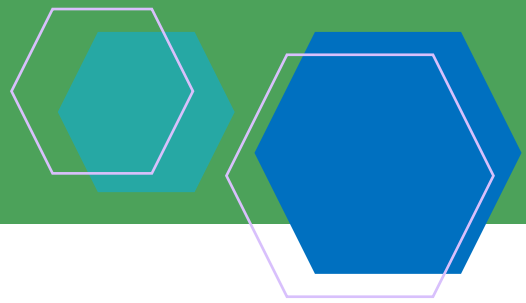

CERTIFICATE II IN AGRICULTURE

NOTE: Based on demand students who choose Agriculture may be combined with the Horticulture class and complete Agriculture-specific electives.

Program Description:

Certificate II is regarded as an entry-level course. This qualification provides a general vocational outcome in agriculture. The qualification enables individuals to select a livestock production or cropping context as a job focus or, in the case of mixed farming enterprises, both. A farm tradesperson is an experienced farmhand and is likely to be involved in co-ordinating a wide range of agricultural operations. Work undertaken as a farm tradesperson will depend on the type of farm production carried out, and includes:

- planting and harvesting crops
- implementing animal and crop husbandry practices
- servicing and repairing farm equipment and machinery
- designing and constructing fencing
- loading and unloading livestock
- installing and maintaining farm water supplies and irrigation systems

Contribution to VCE / VCE VM & VPC

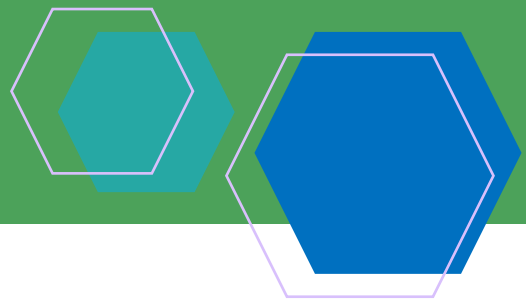

CERTIFICATE III IN ALLIED HEALTH ASSISTANCE (PARTIAL COMPLETION)

Program Description

Certificate III in Allied Health Assistance provides students with the knowledge and skills that will enhance their employment prospects in the Health industry. These qualifications cover workers who provide assistance to allied health professionals and other health professionals with the care of clients.

Pathways / Career Opportunities

Upon successful completion of the Certificate III in Allied Health Assistance you will be prepared for further training to establish your career in a range of health fields. This course has pathways, and possible credit into further study in allied health, remedial massage and nursing.

Contribution to VCE / VCE VM & VPC

These credits must be confirmed with the VET Coordinator at your school.

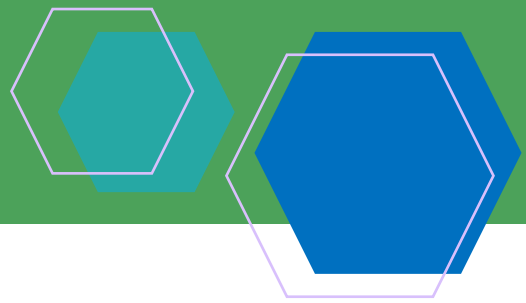

Additional SWL Information

The National Training Package rules require completion of 120 hours of clinical placement (HLT33021). CERTIFICATE III IN SCREEN AND MEDIA

This is also known as the VCE subject Creative Digital Media (CDM)

Program Description:

Units 1 and 2 students learn the key skills to produce digital works and explore a range of Adobe CC software. They use;

- Photoshop to prepare images for the web and advertising.
- Illustrator to explore digital drawing techniques, and illustration.
- Animate to create animations based on a brief.
- Dreamweaver to update and maintain websites.

Units 3 and 4 offers a scored VCE assessment contributing to an ATAR, as well as a VET Certificate. It includes assessments that cover 2D animations, writing content for media, web design and digital graphic design. This is where the students get to work for real and fictional clients and put all their creative thinking and software skills to use.

VCE Exam

If taken as a VCE subject, you will sit an exam at the end of year 12. This exam is predominately practical and sat on a computer. It includes approximately 20 multiple choice questions, 13 short answer question. The practical component requires you to fix a broken website, create a simple animation and write or edit content for the website. Finally placing the content and the animation on the website.

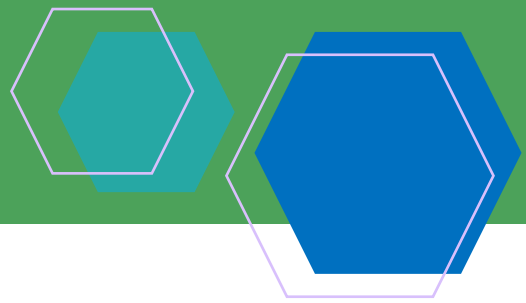
Pathways / Career Opportunities:

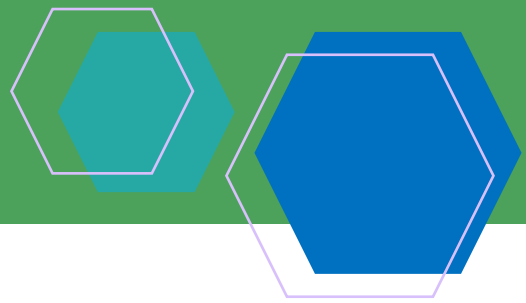

CERTIFICATE III IN SPORT, AQUATICS AND RECREATION

Program Description:

Certificate III in Sport and Recreation provides students with the skills and knowledge to work in the Sport and Recreation industry. In Units 1 and 2, students can choose from a range of electives to create a program of their choice, including teaching the fundamental skills of athletics, basketball, gymnastics or squash and implementing sports injury prevention. Units 3 and 4 offers scored assessment and includes core units such as conduct basic warm-up and cool-down programs, plan and conduct sport and recreation sessions and undertake a risk analysis of activities. Students also undertake electives drawn from the Aquatics, Fitness, Sport and Outdoor Recreation streams.

Students wishing to receive an ATAR contribution for the Units 3 and 4 sequence must undertake scored assessment for the purposes of achieving a study score. This study score can contribute directly to the ATAR, either as one of the student's best four studies (the primary four) or as a fifth or sixth study. Where a student elects not to receive a study score for VCE VET Sport and Recreation, no contribution to the ATAR will be available.

Pathways / Career Opportunities:

Completion of Certificate III in Sport and Recreation may lead to job outcomes including facilitating sport and recreation programs, maintaining grounds and facilities and working in the service industry in locations such as recreation and fitness centres, outdoor sporting grounds or aquatic centres. With additional training and experience, potential job outcomes may include coaching, teaching and sports administrating.



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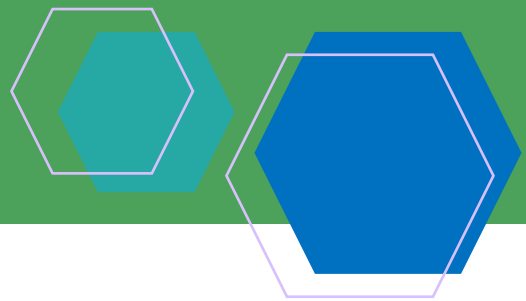
